Understanding the Bible

Jesus' audience was familiar with shepherds. The theme of the good and caring shepherd is clear in Scripture (Ps. 23; Isa. 40:11; Ezek. 34:11-16). Shepherds were common in the hills of Palestine. At the end of a day, when a shepherd brought his flocks in for the night, he would take a careful count. If even one sheep was missing, the shepherd would leave his flock with other shepherds and retrace his steps until he found the lost sheep. No matter how hungry or tired he was, he was devoted to finding the lost sheep. When he did, he rejoiced along with his fellow shepherds.

Jesus addressed His parable to the Pharisees. They criticized Jesus because He associated with sinners whom the religious leaders despised. The Pharisees and teachers of the law believed God forgave sinners who repented and came to Him. But the idea that God loved sinners so much that He would associate with them in that condition and seek them out to save them was not acceptable to the Pharisees and teachers of the law. The Pharisees thought their strict law-keeping pleased God. But actually it is the repentance of sinners who respond to God's love that causes a celebration in heaven.

Jesus told the parable of the lost sheep to a sin-toughened crowd. They were tax collectors and recognized sinners. But there were also men who considered themselves righteous (Pharisees) and teachers of the law. We all need Jesus' love in our lives. Any one of us can feel lost at one time or another. Put yourself in Jesus' story. Imagine that you are the lost lamb. How did you get lost?

God is always reaching out with His great love for us. Whether we see ourselves like the one lost sheep needing rescue, or more like one of the 99 in the fold, Jesus loves us and is always seeking to save us with His grace and mercy.

Jesus is the Good Shepherd who loves us. He gladly gave His life for us (John 10:11), wants us to rest in His love (Matt. 11:28), and celebrates everything His love accomplishes in our lives. What is Jesus' love accomplishing in your life?

When we receive Jesus' forgiveness, when we let His love find us however we are lost, we give Him joy! And His joy over us is shared with all the hosts of heaven. We can pray as Paul prayed in Ephesians 3:18-19, that we may be able "to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ" for us.

When Teaching the Bible to Early-Elementary Students ...

Children this age understand why Jesus would tell a story to teach something important. Children learn in the early years of school that stories may entertain us, but they also can teach important lessons. Trust your children to be ready and willing to learn from the story of the lost sheep that Jesus loves us. But how they respond and apply the lesson may depend on other factors:

- Children learn about love through their early relationships, especially with their parents. Be aware that children who have not had a sound foundation at home in their early years may find it more difficult to believe that Jesus loves them.
- Expressions of love differ from family to family. Try to express God's love to your students in ways that are familiar to them. For example, most children will identify with a hug as showing love.
- Regardless of their early relationships, you can teach children about love through your relationship to them. By consistently demonstrating concern and interest in each child, you are teaching them about how Jesus loves us.

Early Bird Options

Give children who arrive early something meaningful to do. Provide one or more of these activities.

Craft Table - Let the children start thinking about sheep right away. Remove the sheep from the bottom half of Make-It/Take-It, page 31. Let the children decorate the sheep for a bulletin board display.



Drawing – Help the children begin thinking about what it means to love someone. Ask them to draw pictures of someone doing something that shows love.

Fish Game - Let the children review what they have learned. Put out the fish pieces from the Fish Game, Teaching Aid 13. Let the children pick a fish and tell the Bible story and truth they learned from the story.

1 Bible Readiness

Find the Lost Pencil

Today's Bible lesson from Jesus' story of the lost sheep in Luke 15:1-7 teaches students that Jesus loves all of us. Help children get ready to learn from the Bible by looking for a lost item and talking about losing things.

Before class, collect 10 pencils or any item you have 10 of. Hide at least one pencil in your classroom. Try to find an unlikely place to hide the pencil. Hide more than one pencil if you want the activity to take longer or want more children to find a lost pencil.

During class time, have the children help you count the pencils. **Oh, no!** I'm missing a pencil. I should have 10 pencils. Where do you think the missing pencil is? They might suggest you left it at home, or dropped it on the floor. Acknowledge all ideas.

The missing pencil is lost! I counted the pencils today before Sunday school. I'm sure there were 10. Now I only have nine. What could we do to find it? Where do you think we should look? The children will most likely suggest looking in the classroom. Send children to search for the pencil. Call the children back after about 30 seconds. They will probably not have found the pencil. This will help illustrate the need for searching carefully or searching longer. Send the children back to search again. This time give them time to find the pencil.

Show excitement when the lost pencil is found. Yeah! You found the lost pencil! I'm glad you found the lost pencil! Now I have all of my pencils. Losing things isn't fun. But it's probably something we have all done sometime. Let's talk about times you have lost things.

Sharing Time

- What are some things you have lost? You might hear about lost money, toys or parts of toys, dogs, coats, mittens, and so on. Acknowledge all of their lost things are important.
- **O** What do you do when you know something is lost? The children could come up with a lot of different reactions. They would usually look it, but might also tell a parent what they lost, ask someone to help find it, ask a parent to buy a new one. Reinforce how we look for what we lost because it is important.
- How do you feel when you lose something? They could mention feelings such as anger or sadness. Reinforce the sadness of losing something and the importance of finding lost things. Some children might say they don't care about some lost things. Accept these responses without comment.
- **O** How do you feel when you find something that was lost? Most will say they are happy and feel better.

Jesus told a story about someone who lost something important. Jesus told the story to teach people He loves us. Let's listen to Jesus' story.

2 Bible Story

Connect God through His Word

Before class, read Luke 15:1-7 and the Bible story presented below. Add self-adhesive hook or glue dots to the figures of Teaching Aid 15. Practice telling the Bible story aloud as you move the figures. Let your voice give expression to the drama of the story.

In class, bring the children around you so they can see you and the story board. Explain to the children that Jesus did many good things. One of these good things was to teach us by telling good stories. Open your Bible to Luke 15:1-7. Tell them that today's story comes from the book of Luke. Have a child find Luke on the Bible Timeline. Keep your Bible open during your story time.

Jesus Loves Us: Luke 15:1-7



Place Jesus, Figure 1, at upper right of the story board.) Jesus often taught people about Himself by telling stories. His stories gave people word

pictures for what He wanted them to learn. One day Jesus told a story about a sheep and a shepherd to teach us about His love. Here is how the story went.

Once there was a shepherd. (Place shepherd, Figure 2, and sheep, Figure 3, at lower left.) This shepherd had 100 sheep to take care of! (Place Figures 4 and 5 near the shepherd.)

The shepherd loved each of his sheep. Every morning he led the sheep to fields where they could eat fresh green grass. (Place rock and bush, Figures 6 and 7, at the center, with the lost sheep, Figure 8, hidden behind the bush. Move the sheep and shepherd near the rock and bush.) Near the end of each day, the shepherd brought the sheep home to be safe. (Move sheep and shepherd to the far left; remove Figure 3.)

Every night the shepherd counted the sheep to be sure he didn't lose any sheep. (Count and point to the sheep.) He counted, "One, two, three, four." He kept counting until at last he was near the end. "95, 96, 97, 98, 99. (Pause and look around.) I should have 100 sheep. Oh no, one of my sheep is lost!"

After he made sure the 99 sheep were safe, the shepherd went to look for the one lost sheep because he loved all of his sheep, including the lost one. (Move shepherd to the right.) The sun went down and it got dark, but still the shepherd looked. He looked everywhere. (Move shepherd to rock, Figure 6.) Finding the sheep was very important to him. He went back to the field of green grass where the sheep spent the day. The lost sheep wasn't there. He looked behind rocks, but he didn't find the lost sheep there either. The shepherd didn't stop looking because he loved the lost sheep just like he loved all of his sheep. Then at last the shepherd heard a familiar sound from behind a bush.

(Lift one side of the bush and pull out the lost sheep, Figure 8.) The shepherd looked behind the bush. There was the lost sheep! He found the sheep. (Place sheep, Figure 8, around the shepherd's shoulders and move them to the far left.) The shepherd picked it up and carried the sheep back home. He put the sheep that was lost with the other 99. Now all of his sheep were together where he could protect them. The shepherd was so happy that he called his friends and neighbors and said, "Come to a party. Celebrate with me because I found my lost sheep!"

(Hold Jesus, Figure 1, in front of you.) Jesus told this story to help us learn that He loves us just like the shepherd who loved all of his sheep. Jesus loves you, (point to each child) and you, and you. Jesus loves us.

Engage children with questions that help them recall the Bible story

Involve children in retelling the Bible story to make it stick

Bible Story Review Questions

- **O** Who did the shepherd love? The shepherd loved all of his sheep.
- What did the shepherd lose? The shepherd lost a sheep.
- O Why did the shepherd go look for the lost sheep? The shepherd loved the lost sheep. The shepherd loved all of his sheep.
- What did the shepherd do when he found the sheep? The shepherd took the sheep home. He put the sheep with the others. He called his friends to come to a party.
- C Why did the shepherd call his friends to come to a party? He was happy that he found the sheep that he loved.
- Why did Jesus tell this story? Jesus told the story to help us learn that He loves us.
- **O** Who loves us? Jesus loves us.

Guide your children in acting out this Bible story. Help them place chairs in an open circle for a sheep pen. Ask one volunteer to be the shepherd. Have the rest of the class be the sheep.

Start with the shepherd leading all of her sheep out of the pen in the morning. Select one sheep to go hide. Then have the shepherd lead all but the one lost sheep back to the pen. Let the shepherd count the sheep as they go in. Have the shepherd announce what she discovers. Let the shepherd go find the one lost sheep and lead it back to the sheep pen. Then have the shepherd call out, "I found my lost sheep! Come celebrate with me!" Invite everyone to jump up and shout, "Jesus loves us."

Repeat the story play to allow different children to volunteer to be the shepherd and the lost sheep.

Bible Story Review Activity

Early-elementary age children like to use their knowledge for acting out stories they know. This activity will also help the children connect themselves with the sheep as the ones that God loves.

Memory Verse Practice

The memory verse will help the children remember that Jesus did good things like teaching us about His love through stories.

Have the children say the verse with you. Repeat the verse five times, each time replacing a word with a clap, as in the song "B-I-N-G-O."

The last time will be five claps followed by everyone saying "Acts 10:38." $\,$

For a variation, ask the children to suggest different silent actions to do for each word you leave out. Some possible actions might be: jump, hop, turn around, step forward, step backward, and so on.

Show the class page 39 as you point to the white drawing area in the hand mirror frame. Tell the children to draw a picture of themselves in the hand mirror. Then the children write their own names on the blank lines at the bottom. Reinforce that Jesus loves each of them when you visit this center. On page 40 the children search for 18 lost sheep. Let them search and color the hidden sheep. Remember that Jesus loves every one of us, so don't miss any of the hidden sheep!




Story Plays with Masks

Before you begin the story plays, let the children make their own sheep masks. Have the children remove the masks from the page, then remove the eye holes and open the nose slit. Show them where to tape yarn for tying the masks on their heads.

If you guided the children in the Bible story play review activity on page 75, then they should be ready to conduct their own Bible story plays. If you didn't use the Bible story review activity, you might use the suggestions for the active review on page 75 to help guide this activity.



Find the Lost Sheep Game

In Jesus' story, the shepherd went looking for the lost sheep because he loved each of his sheep. Your students can better understand Jesus' love for them by searching for a lost sheep, too. Tell the children to pick a volunteer to hide the sheep, Figure 3. Then the other players search for the sheep. When they find it, let them celebrate by saying, "We found the lost sheep." Play more rounds, but have a different volunteer hide the sheep each time.

4 Bible Response

We learned from Jesus' story that Jesus is like the shepherd who loved all of his sheep. Jesus loves each one of us.

How do you know Jesus loves you? Let the children have time to think. The quality of their answers can depend on having enough uninterrupted thinking time. When the children respond you will hear a variety of ideas. Some responses might be: the Bible tells us, He cares for us, He gives us what we need, and so on.

Jesus told His story about the shepherd and his sheep so everyone would know that He loves us.

How could we help others know that Jesus loves them? Let them think and talk. Some ideas might be: tell others the story of the shepherd, show people my lamb mask, have people look in a mirror and tell them they are looking at someone Jesus loves, etc.

Here are badges you can use to help you remember Jesus loves you, and you might use them to tell others about Jesus too! Hand out Bible Beginnings, pages 41 and 42, scissors, and pencils.

Keep one of the badges for your reminder. On that badge, write your name on the line after "Jesus loves _

Let the children have time to write their names on a badge they pick.

Give the other two badges to others to let them know Jesus loves all of us. Think of others you would like to give a "Jesus loves me!" badge to. Offer to print names on the board to help the children write names of others. Children might write names of family members, friends, classmates, and so on. Let them cut out the badges if time allows.

What do you plan to do with your badges? Let the children talk. Reinforce ideas. Plans can be unlimited. Some ideas might be: put my reminder badge in my room, give two badges to friends at school tomorrow, wait till I find someone who is sad, and so on.
