Your students understand that Jesus would tell a story to teach something important. Children learn in the early years of school that stories may entertain us, but they also can teach important lessons. Trust your children to be ready and willing to learn from the story of the lost sheep that Jesus loves us. Some children may find it more difficult to believe that Jesus loves them. By consistently demonstrating concern and interest in each child, you are teaching them about how Jesus loves us.

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# Understanding the Bible

The parable of the lost sheep is followed by two other parables in Luke 15. Jesus told these parables in response to an objection by the Pharisees and the teachers of the law. These men said that Jesus welcomed sinners and ate with them. Jesus wanted the self-righteous religious leaders to know He did this because of God's love for everyone. "Pharisees" (vs. 2) were highly committed lay people. They were dedicated to carrying out the 613 commandments (or rules) of the rabbis (or Jewish teachers). Unlike the Sadducees, the Pharisees believed that all those oral laws were binding (as well as Scripture). Most of the chief priests were of the religious party of the Sadducees (who only held to the first five books in the Old Testament).

The "scribes" (Luke 15:2, KJV) were those who originally transcribed (or copied) the Scriptures. (Ezra was a scribe.) Eventually the scribes (in New Testament times) were considered to be the experts in the Old Testament law (compare the parallel accounts of Mark 12:28, KJV ["one of the scribes"] with Matt. 22:35, KJV ["a lawyer"].) The scribes were like Bible scholars or theologians among the Jews.

"Sinners" were usually considered to be those one people who were adulterers and robbers, all often included people who lacked the total follow the laws of Moses, as interpreteachers of the law. "Publicans" (vs. 1, time together time together)

word for tax collectors. Tax collectors were especially hated by many Jewish people. Not only did they collect the taxes for the Romans who occupied Israel, but they also frequently cheated their own people and charged excessive taxes in order to make themselves rich.

By eating with "sinners," Jesus established fellowship with these people and indicated acceptance of them. His association with these despised persons showed God's interest and concern for them.

Jesus always went beyond outward appearances and looked at the hearts of people. He said that repentance was essential and hinted that the Pharisees thought they needed no repentance. The Pharisees totally overlooked God's grace, love, and forgiveness.

God's love for each of us is expressed in the story of the lost sheep. The shepherd left 99 sheep in order to find one sheep that was lost. Jesus said that even as the shepherd rejoiced over finding one sheep, there is rejoicing in heaven "over one sinner who repents" (Luke 15:7).

Notice the percentages in the three parables. Jesus shifts from one-out-of-a-hundred sheep (Luke 15:4) to one-out-of-ten coins (Luke 15:8) to one-out-of-transport (Luke 15:11). ### Classroom Tips

### Here are some ways to help all of your students experience God's love.

- Focus on the individual care the shepherd gives each of his sheep, and model this love. Comfort your students when they are sad; listen excitedly when they are glad. They'll soon believe that God loves them too!
- Since each child is special to you, find something to commend in each one.
- Call each child by name, for no other word sounds as sweet to him or her. If you have trouble remembering names, don't be afraid to use name tags. Children love them!
- Some children may need extra attention—those who feel "lost" because they are new or wondering if others like them. As you remind them that God loves them, show them that you do too! When you talk to them, sit on a low chair or kneel beside them so that you are at their eye level.

# Before Class Getting Started

Give each child a personal greeting. Your personal remarks will let each child know that he or she is special to Jesus and to you. Today we will hear a Bible story that tells us how much Jesus loves us.

The following activities will prepare the children for the story of the lost sheep.

- from page 3 of Make-It/Take-It. The children can color the sheep or add cotton to make them soft. You may want to display the sheep on a bulletin board. Today we will hear a Bible story about sheep.
- Story Fish Game: For review of previous lessons, use
  Teaching Aid 13 and the fishing pole from last week. Add the

  Let children play using the rules you taught in Lesson 8.
- Drawing: Help the children begin thinking about what it means to love someone. Ask them to draw pictures of someone doing something that shows love. We can show someone we love them by what we do.

Life Need 5 minutes

Objective: That your students will talk about times they have been lost.

This activity will prepare your students for the Bible story about the lost sheep. Before the children arrive, hide a stuffed animal. During class, talk about the feelings we have when we are lost.

Have you ever been lost? (Let the children tell about times they were lost.) How did you feel? (Probably scared, alone.) We have a stuffed animal that is lost. Let's all look for it. We can pretend we are parents looking for a lost child.

Encourage the children to talk about their feelings as they search. Are you worried about the stuffed animal? I'm worried too. I hope we find it soon. She may be crying because she's afraid.

Children who have not attended school may be unfamiliar with classroom games. If they don't know where to look, give them hints or let them follow you as you look for the stuffed animal. I think I heard a noise near the bookcase. Try looking over there.

Express joy when the stuffed animal is found. We found the stuffed animal! Now we all are happy. Pretend to talk to the stuffed animal. We were so worried about you. We're so glad we found you!

- What are some things you have lost? (You might hear about lost money, toys or parts of toys, dogs, coats, mittens, and so on. Acknowledge all of their lost things are important.)
- What do you do when you know something is lost? (Children would usually look for it, but might also tell a parent what they lost, ask someone to help find it, ask a parent to buy a new one. Reinforce how we look for what we lost because it is important.)
- How do you feel when you lose something? (Anger, sadness. Reinforce the sadness of losing something and the importance of finding lost things.)
- How do you feel when you find something that was lost? (Most will say they are happy and feel better.)

Jesus told a story about someone who lost something important. Jesus told the story to teach people He loves us. Let's listen to Jesus' story.

(Lift one side of the bush and pull out the lost sheep, Figure 8.) The shepherd looked behind the bush. There was the lost sheep! (Place sheep, Figure 8, around the shepherd's shoulders and move them to the far left.) The shepherd picked it up and carried the sheep back home. He put the sheep back with the other 99. ### **BIBLE STORY**

(Place Jesus, Figure 1, at upper right of the story boar 1.) Jesus taught people about Himself by telling

stories. One day He told a story about a sheep and a shepherd to teach us about His love.

There was a shepherd (Place shepherd,

Figure 2, and

sheep, Figure 3, at lower left.) who had one hundred sheep to take care of! (Place Figures 4 and 5 near the shepherd.)

The shepherd loved each of his sheep. Every morning he led them to fields where they could eat fresh green grass. (Place rock and bush, Figures 6 and 7, at the center, with the lost sheep, Figure 8, hidden behind the bush. Move the sheep and shepherd near the rock and bush.) Near the end of each day. the shepherd brought the sheep home to be safe. (Move sheep and shepherd to the left; remove Figure 3.)

Every night the shepherd counted the sheep to be sure he didn't lose any sheep. (Count and point to the sheep.) He counted, "One, two, three, four . . . " He kept counting until at last he was near the end. "95, 96, 97, 98, 99. (Look around.) I should have 100 sheep. One of my sheep is lost!" After he made sure the 99 sheep were safe,

Bible Application 10 minutes

Objective: That your students will learn that Jesus loves them.

### **MEMORY VERSE**

Help students find the verse on page 4 of *Storytime*. Read it together with your students. In today's story, Jesus helped people learn that He loves us. Our poem tells about some of the good things Jesus did. When we say the poem, listen for these things. Say the poem together.

Jesus went around doing good. (Walk in place.)

What good things did He do?
(Hold flat palm over eyes as if looking.)
He taught, forgave; He helped and prayed.

(Clap twice after each action word.)

I want to be like Jesus too.
(Walk in place.)

Jesus teaches, forgives, helps, and prays. Let's say our memory verse says again: "Jesus went around doing good" (Acts 10:38). Everything Jesus did was good.

Collect the *Storytime* papers and then put them away until the end of class.

### **HANDCRAFT**

Before class, remove  ${\it Make-It/Take-It}$  for Lesson 10 from each booklet and cut two 12-inch pieces of yarn for each student.

Help the students remove the masks and eyeholes. Some of them may wish to color their projects while others may prefer to keep their sheep white. Then show the students how to tape a piece of yarn to each side of the sheep's face near the ear.

Optional: you might want to provide the children with bits of cotton to glue onto their masks as fluffy sheep's wool.

Tie the masks around your students' heads. Earlyelementary age children like to use their knowledge for acting out stories they know. This activity will also help

the children connect themselves with the sheep as the ones that Jesus loves.

Guide your children in acting out this Bible story. Help them place chairs in an open circle for a

sheep pen. Ask one volunteer to be the shepherd. Have the rest of the class be the sheep.

Start with the shepherd leading all of her sheep out of the pen in the morning. Select one sheep to go hide. Then have the shepherd lead all but the one lost sheep back to the pen. Let the shepherd count the sheep as they go in. Have the shepherd announce what she discovers. Let the shepherd go find the one lost sheep and lead it back to the sheep pen. Then have the shepherd call out, "I found my lost sheep! Come celebrate with me!" Invite everyone to jump up and shout, "Jesus loves us!"

Repeat the story play to allow different children to volunteer to be the shepherd and the lost sheep.

Jesus loves each one of us, too, like the shepherd loved each of his sheep.

### **CLOSING ACTIVITIES**

Show God's love to your class by playing "lost and found." In advance, cut out a paper heart for each child and print the child's name on it. Have the children cover their eyes so that you can hide the hearts. (You might want to hide the hearts before class.)

■ How do you know Jesus loves you? (Let the children have time to think. The quality of their answers can depend on having enough uninterrupted thinking time. When the children respond you will hear a variety of ideas. Some responses might be: the Bible tells us, He cares for us, He gives us what we need, and so on.)

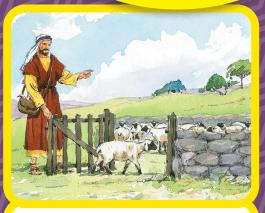

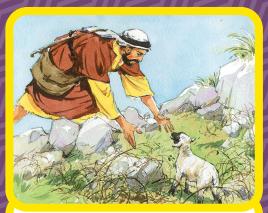


A shepherd had 100 sheep.
